To the shops? To the beach? To town? To see family?


To the countryside? To a farm?

Use the symbols below as ideas and prompts.













- Set up some chairs or cushions as a pretend bus or train
- Use toys as passengers or members of your family!
- Take it in turns to be the driver and collect your fares from your passengers. Encourage your child to understand the exchange of money for a ticket to ride.
- Decide how much a ticket will cost. Help your child to count out the right number of pennies. If they are confident with this, help them to exchange eg 2 pennies for a 2p.




















After a hot and busy journey, why not stop off at the ice-cream shop?







You will need: small bowls, spoons (or toilet roll/kitchen roll tubes/egg boxes made into 'cones'), paper (screwed up into ball shapes for the ice cream), tiny pieces of paper or pompoms or glitter for 'sprinkles'.


Have a chat and think of flavours you might like. Decide how much the ice-creams will cost – eg one scoop is 5p, 2 scoops are 10p, sprinkles are 2p. Have fun setting out your 'shop' and selling your ice-creams! Maybe you can have a real ice-cream as a treat when you've finished? ☺





















Today's Sensory Theme is BLUE














Make a blue themed sensory box/basket by collecting objects from around your house that are blue. Choose different textures and shades of blue for your child to explore.

Make a blue themed sensory bottle by filling an empty water bottle with half oil (baby oil or vegetable oil) half water and some blue food colouring. Add blue glitter, pompoms, small shells or small blue funky foam shapes and make sure you seal the lid with gaffer tape or a glue gun. Test it is leak-proof before letting your child explore the colours and patterns when the bottle is tipped and turned. Share the experience together  $\odot$ 

Make a blue sensory pat mat – half fill a strong ziplock bag with the same mixture as for the sensory bottle. Squeeze the air out then seal the bag and place inside a second bag before taping the pat mat to a table top or tray for your child to explore. You could tape it to the window to look at and explore the colours and shapes with the light shining through.
